We came 1st in our heat in the Year 3/4 and 5/6
Sportshall Athletics and then 2nd overall in the Crewe and Nantwich final.
We have had 1st, 2nd and 3rd place winners in Cross
Country competitions. Our Year 3 team came 2nd in a tennis tournament and we came 3rd overall in the annual Town Sports
Competition.

We began a Sports Booster Club run weekly by our PE specialist. This club targets those children who may lack some of the fundamental skills required for their overall physical literacy and children who may lack confidence in sport and fitness. This club has given those children increased confidence and they are now entering competitions and tournaments.

All children (regardless of ability) took part in our annual charity race. Each class ran various distances around the 40m track and raised over £4700 for the Donna Louise Hospice Trust.

Sports Week ran for the second year running, with our PE Specialist, teaching staff and outside agencies running lots of different sporting events. These included: golf, dance, Zumba, athletics, football, cricket and goal ball.

Purchase of the Amaven PE software package £1500 per year

To provide the PE coordinator, specialist PE teacher and class teachers with data of physical literacy results for the whole school.

Physical Literacy for the whole school improved by 25%, going from a previous score of 2.99 out of 5 to 3.75.

Body Control increased from 3.38 to 4.18.

Object Control increased from 3.51 to 4.10.

Lower Body Strength increased from 3.24 to 3.77.

Flexibility increased from 2.64 to 2.70.

Speed increased from 3.22 to 3.59.

Agility increased from 3.22 to 3.59.

Upper Body Strength increased from 3.27 to 4.29.

Class 1 saw an improvement of 25%, with 10 children working at Expected Level and 20 working at Exceeding.

Class 2 saw a 54% improvement, with 10 children working at Expected Level and 19 children working at Exceeding.

Class 3 saw an improvement of 27%, with only 1 child emerging, 16 working at expected and 12 exceeding.

Class 4 saw a 15% improvement, with 1 child emerging, 17 working at expected and 12 exceeding.

			Class 5 saw a 17% improvement, with 1 child emerging, 18 working at expected and 11 exceeding. Class 6 saw a 29% improvement with 1 child emerging, 16 working at expected and 12 exceeding.
